



AUDUBON WILDLIFE SANCTUARIES OF KEWEENAW COUNTY



Brockway Mountain Drive Sanctuary: Located in a major migratory flyway, this 394-acre sanctuary in Keweenaw County is entirely wooded with a mixture of northern conifers and hardwoods. Its highest point is along Brockway Ridge which is easily accessible by Brockway Drive. A 2 mile Oren Krumm trail circumnavigates the ridge. Bird-life includes winged and Sharp-shinned Hawks and the occasional Golden Eagle. Twinflower, many orchids, plants of rock outcroppings and wet forest are found here.

Lake Bailey Wildlife Sanctuary: This is an entirely wooded 405-acre sanctuary in Keweenaw County. The low area immediately adjacent to the parking area is cedar swamp but it is usually dry and passable using the hiking trail. The 2.3 mile trail traverses a steep incline through a hardwood forest to a precipice overlooking the area. Migrating birds of prey are especially abundant in the spring. Likely sightings include Broad-winged Hawk, Sharp-Shinned Hawk, and the occasional Peregrine Falcon or Bald Eagle.

Sanctuary Rules

- Hunting, trapping, pets, camping, fires, ORVs, motorcycles, and snowmobiles are prohibited.
- The taking of specimens of any kind (plant, animal, or mineral) is restricted
